October is Fire Prevention Month



October is Fire Prevention Month, which is a great reminder to make sure your business or home is prepared. By taking a few steps now, you can ensure you're able to prevent fires from happening, and also that you're prepared should a fire break out in your building or home.

National Fire Prevention Month is celebrated every October to raise awareness about the importance of fire safety.



Test your smoke alarms. The Arc Maintenance Dept. checks smoke alarms monthly.



Create or update your fire escape plan. Each of our homes and facilities have an evacuation plan.



Keep fire extinguishers handy. The Arc Maintenance Dept. regularly checks building and vehicle fire extinguishers. Make sure the arrow is pointed to the green area and the tag is up to date.



Clear clutter from around exits and appliances. It is important to keep these areas clear plus walkways, stairs, hallways, ramps, and sidewalks



Educate yourself and your team about fire safety and what to do in case of an emergency



Make sure your exit and emergency lighting and systems are functioning properly. Security systems, too. Keep up with any mandated inspections and perform any required maintenance and battery replacements. The Arc Maintenance Dept. provides monthly and quarterly inspections for exit/emergency lighting and replaces batteries yearly.
